





What Residents Use

- Busiest library system in Pennsylvania!
- Since 1994, population has grown 21%. Library use has grown even more:
 - Children's use has increased 133%
 - Homebound senior use has increased 164%
- Services are constantly evolving:
 - Classes and events for youth and adults
 - Technology access and support





What Library Users Report

Summer Reading Program:

 When kids don't participate in summer reading programs, they fall behind. By the end of 5th grade, kids in need are nearly 3 grades behind.

Technology Internet Access:

- 13% of library Internet users are low income
- 4% don't have regular Internet access
- 42% ask library staff for help and assistance






How We Fund It – Part 1


Operating Revenue - 2013

- People to have family sustaining jobs
